The Paddy O'Donoghue Centre (POD) is operated by the City of Greater Dandenong Council and is closed to the general public. This means that if you wish to visit us at the Dandenong U3A office you need to call us when you arrive at the front door to gain access.

Nametags

Please ensure you have the current Nametag. You can identify the latest format Nametag by the absence of a date. In the office we are holding quite a few Nametags which have not been distributed to members. You can call us to make arrangements to pick up your Nametag.

Emergency Contact

Absences

A reminder that it is courteous to advise of absences from classes. We have several ways this can be done.

- If you know in advance that you will be away you can tell the person responsible for the class roll (usually your tutor) that you will be away for the next class and then they can mark it on the roll.
- For those who have not yet explored the web site option you can log into the dandenongu3a.org.au web site and in the menu on the left side click on "My Absences", enter the details of your absence, then when you click on submit an email will automatically be sent to your Tutor/Course Coordinator. If you can't remember your password, you can refer to the instructions in the first few slides of the Membership-renewal-Presentation which can be found on the dandenongu3a.org.au web site under "memberships".
- If your tutor has given you their contact details you can notify them directly.
- Alternatively, you can phone your absence into the office or email it to admin@dandenongu3a.org.au. The office will then notify the tutor.

Ancient Worlds Monday 12.15 - 2.00

In this class various topics of the ancient world are looked at, all either with the kingdoms of Mesopotamia or the Roman Empire. We have looked at the early history of Gaza and its destruction by Alexander the Great, the rebuilding of Gaza by the Romans and the Roman interest that lasted till the fall of the Empire. We looked at the Oracles of Delphi and the oracle of Amon Re that Alexander the Great visited to legitimize his reign as Pharaoh when Egypt was governed by the Ptolemies.

At the minute we are looking at the Persian Rule and of Cambyses, the son of Cyrus the Great who sent an army to destroy the oracle of Amon Re because the oracle had not given Cambyses the news he wanted to hear, the army vanished and despite many attempts to find it, none really have succeeded, even a belief by some that the army was just a legend. We have now started on the history of Darius the Great, the third king of the Persian Empire.

In this class I appreciate input from the class and generally I receive that and in many cases because of that, a chapter on a subject is never completed.
